OVERVIEW OF PHILANTHROPY IN THE SOUTHWEST

IN THE SEVEN-STATE PHILANTHROPY SOUTHWEST REGION, private and community foundations contributed over \$5 billion to charitable causes in 2011, representing an 18% increase over giving from 2009. The membership of Philanthropy Southwest increased their giving in 2011 over 2009 levels by even more – 31%. In 2011, member foundations gave \$1.4 billion, with over 50% of that giving directed toward education, human services, and health care.

This study of grantmaking in the Southwest was captured through an analysis by Jankowski Associates, Inc. of over 88,000 individual grants made in 2011 by 5,868 private and community foundations. Over \$5 billion dollars was distributed one grant at a time by staff and trustees who listened to compelling cases of opportunity and need and responded to a vision of a better future. This vision includes children receiving an excellent education, families prospering, individuals with health challenges experiencing hopeful diagnoses, diverse groups finding reconciliation and understanding, faith-based agencies strengthening services, and a multitude of other expectant dreams for our states, region, nation, and world.

Over 88,000 grants translates into many more thousands of conversations with nonprofit organization leaders, development directors, and practitioners in the field. 2011 was a period of increased need and great change. Conditions of continuing economic uncertainty and a changing health care landscape heavily impacted nonprofit organizations. The nonprofit working environment was, and continues to be, influenced by an evolving concept of impact and accountability. Nonprofit organizations navigated all of this to provide grantmaking foundations with compelling and rewarding opportunities to invest in the possibilities. In fact, in 2010 and 2011, 81 new foundations were formed in the Southwest region with a 2011 valuation of over \$1 billion in assets.

Grantmaking in the Southwest happens within the larger context of philanthropy across the United States. A 2013 study by the Foundation Center¹ provided a snapshot of 2011 giving on a national scale. Total national foundation assets were reported to be \$662 billion, and total national giving was reported at \$49 billion. A comparison between the Foundation Center data and Southwest regional data suggests that this region holds about 10% of philanthropic dollars nationally.


Foundations in the Southwest region granted 34% of their funding outside their home state in 2011. Likewise, many national grantmakers contributed funding and thought-leadership in the Southwest region. Philanthropy Southwest acknowledges the continuing enrichment that out-of-region funders bring to the Southwest.²

Philanthropy Southwest is pleased to report that an active exchange of ideas, constructive relationships, and excellence in philanthropic practice continues to lead to the ongoing enrichment of the Southwest region and its population. The following pages include regional and state-by-state breakdowns of Southwest giving in 2011. This report is a snapshot of that year, but there is more to the narrative of philanthropy in the Southwest. We look forward to exploring that further in future discussions and subsequent reports.

¹Jankowski Associates' researchers identified 5,868 independent grantmaking or community foundations in the Conference of Southwest Foundation's seven states that reported assets of at least \$5 million or grants paid of at least \$10,000 between 2009 and 2011. With more than 99% of the foundations filing 2011 IRS tax forms, the data contained in these tables and charts is the most current and comprehensive data available.






B I MEMBER STATES OVERVIEW

Philanthropy Southwest members account for 34% of assets and 26% of total giving in the region. The average grant by Philanthropy Southwest members is higher than the average grant across all foundations within the seven-state region (\$55,388 is the average of all foundations in the region; \$71,396 is the average Philanthropy Southwest member foundation grant).





On average, foundations in member states give approximately 60% of contributions in their home state and 40% out of state.




Table F.1: Break out of giving in-state, out-of-state, and in the southwest region










